#### Tensión y eutensión en la sala de clase

Múltiples factores determinan el rendimiento escolar estudiantil. Orlandini (1999) comenta que los períodos de aprendizaje en todos los niveles educativos provocan tensión y afectan el rendimiento estudiantil.

Para Barker y MacIntyre (2000) los estudiantes están constantemente bajo tensión porque además de la de aprender un nuevo idioma, tienen que hablarlo y cumplir con las normas establecidas para acreditar la materia. Martín (2007) refiere que la tensión se propicia bajo diferentes circunstancias y cuando se incrementa puede provocar reacciones corporales y emociones incontrolables. Cabe mencionar que no solamente puede afectar al estudiantado sino también al profesorado (Polo, et al, 1996).

La tensión normalmente se asocia con la activación de retos, desafíos y exigencias que repercuten negativamente durante situaciones diversas ante la imposibilidad de cumplir las demandas establecidas necesarias para acreditar la clase. La tensión suele estar presente a lo largo de la vida estudiantil; por ejemplo cuando los alumnos presentan un examen o reciben una nota y únicamente culmina cuando la

meta deseada se alcanza. Además de la tensión, también está la tensión positiva o eutensión relacionada directamente con el rendimiento académico.

Witkin (2000) clasifica la tensión en: a) escolar, cuando afecta durante la educación básica y b) académico, cuando se da a nivel medio y superior de enseñanza.

Los investigadores recomiendan disminuir la tensión escolar y crear alternativas para mejorar el aprendizaje mediante actividades que fomenten eutensión. Asignar pequeños proyectos a grupos de varios estudiantiles, de acuerdo a Barraza (2006), fomenta competitividad entre los estudiantes e interacción con otros compañeros además integra al grupo y elimina el aislamiento de algunos estudiantes García-Ros et al, 1996. Goleman (como se citó en Talavera, 2007) piensa que la comunicación y el trabajo en equipo fomentan productividad y disipan conflictos sociales que se pudieran presentar.

Por otra parte, cuando la relación maestro-estudiante es positiva, las relaciones personales generan el ambiente ideal para que el rendimiento estudiantil sea superior (Bisquerra y Escoda, 2007).

### **Exchange Students: The Secret Sauce to Language Motivation**


I hate to admit it, but I was one of those kids who took a foreign language in high school because two years were required to walk the stage at the end of my senior year. In other words, it was a graduation requirement. Fortunately, it still is a graduation requirement or some of us might be teaching to classes of four or five students or worse yet, teaching algebra or something equally unpleasant. After I finished my second, obligatory year of high school Spanish, I was done.

What changed between then and now to the extent where I now make a living teaching Spanish? Two words: exchange students. Or more specifically: Kerstin, an exchange student from Germany I met her during my freshman year in college. She was doing a year as an exchange student at Santa Teresa High School in San Jose, from where I graduated the previous year. She had already finished high school in Germany, but wanted to learn English, so she became an American high school senior. Meeting her was highly unlikely. I went home one weekend to attend a talent show at my former high school, a show that I had co-MC'd the previous year. I was introduced by a mutual friend. We started dating and well, I fell hard for this German exchange student.

I'd like to say, we got married and lived happily ever after, but that didn't happen. In fact, quite the opposite. The relationship ended shortly after she returned to Germany that summer. But having a hard time getting over her I concocted a plan to, well, leave school for a while and travel to Germany. This was no small decision. It involved not enrolling for the second semester of my junior year at Chico State, ('dropped out' was the term circulating among my family) moving to Reno, working two jobs, renting a room from an elderly lady who lived in a mobile home that shook when she coughed, and taking a five-days-a-week 7:30 a.m. German language class at the University of Nevada,

Reno. Needless to say, at this point in my life, I didn't win any points with my parents.

I arrived in London in late May. After some days in England and France I made it to Mainz Germany, where she lived. Let's just say it was abundantly clear that the relationship was over.



To put it mildly, she had 'moved on.' Fortunately, I did get to meet her new boyfriend. At this point I remember having one of the most coherent thoughts I had ever had up until this point in my life. I could either be sad, very sad, or I could enjoy backpacking around Europe in June for the reminder of my month long trip. I chose the latter.

It wasn't long before it occurred to me during one of my many hours long Eurail train excursions that the average European takes second language learning a lot more seriously than the average American. In fact, running into people who spoke three and even four languages was not unusual. This made me feel, well, stupid. I had managed to learn enough German to be a polite tourist, but that is far from being conversant, much less fluent. I was not anywhere near Spain and even if I were, my two years of high school Spanish and two years of college Spanish (essentially a repeat of high school Spanish) would not have enabled me to win any friends and influence people.

I was also made acutely aware that Europeans on average get 30 days of 'holiday' every year and that Australians routinely take a gap YEAR off to travel the world between university and entering a profession. That's a far cry from the typical two week corporate America summer vacation. This was a revelation to the 21 year old me.

So, I came up with a plan: I will live in Mexico, Continues on page 6

speak only Spanish, volunteer for some organization and then after a few months travel through Mexico, Central and South America and finally meet up with Pablo, an Argentine who spoke English, German and French, and whom I had met while backpacking around Austria and Switzerland. He said that if I ever made it to Buenos Aires, Argentina, I could stay at his family's house. This seemed like a good goal.

Fast forward two years. Still highly motivated from my Europe trip, for two years I jammed as much Spanish into my head as I possibly could in preparation for my trip. I managed to score a volunteer job with the Salvation Army at a 'Hogar de Ninos' ('children's home,' essentially an orphanage) in Veracruz, Mexico. This months long experience surrounded by people who spoke zero English was the best immersion experience I could have ever imagined and set the stage for me to later become a Spanish teacher.

After leaving Veracruz I did travel all over Mexico, made it to Belize, Guatemala, Costa Rica, and Panama, and then down to various countries in South America where I finally met up with Pablo, my Argentine backpacking contact. I stayed with his family for a week. It was strange and happy ending to a chance meeting with a German exchange student.

Whenever possible I always drop the seed on my students that a semester or year on exchange to another country will change their lives in ways they can't imagine and that they should strongly consider it. I do believe that this is an easier thing to pull off in college than in high school since most, if not all U.S. universities have exchange programs where students pay the same tuition to study abroad as they would be paying to the school they're attending. Also, a lot of high school students aren't emotionally ready to live abroad. Although, a current tenth grade student of mine did do a two month exchange to Granada, Spain



this last summer and came back wanting much more advanced work than the rest of the class was receiving. He is now highly motivated.

### LESSON PLAN Tobacco Control

Lesson Objectives:

- Students extract thesis statements and argumentative claims from a debate on banning smoking in public places.
- Students formulate their rebuttals to support legislation.
- Students write a short essay on effective methods to quit smoking.

#### Activation of Schemata (Lead-in)

Start questions for students to talk about:

- 1. Give statistics about China's cigarette smoking and victims of secondhand smoke.
- 2. Talk about the different diseases that are caused by smoking if you know anyone who has such diseases.
- 3. Posters on smoking tobacco in China

**Presentation** (Introduction of New Material)

Video: a debate on banning smoking in public places

Students are asked to preview a video clip the night before. The class is divided into the Affirmative side (supporting legislation) and the Negative side (not supporting legislation).

- The Affirmative fills out the female contender's thesis statement and supporting details to her argumentative speech, while the Negative does the male contender.
- Then, verify comprehension by reading the female/male clip transcript respectively and looking up key words. Make as many corrections as possible on your own and mark the areas needing clarification for in-class Q & A with peers or Instructor.

In class and in pairs, the students exchange the information they've extracted the night before.

- Report back: Group A talks about the reasoning for the Affirmative side; Group B talks about the Negative side.
- As needed, ask the instructor for final clarification.
- As a wrap up to the Presentation, the class views the Youtube clip one last time. Listen specifically for the information the individual was not able to decipher.



**Practice** (Guided Practice)

Give a Rebuttal (i.e. the "no, you're wrong and this is why" argument) In the video clip, the male contender

made quasi-logical arguments against legislation. Evaluate his arguments in terms of accuracy, credibility, relevancy, and/or culturally biased assumptions, etc. Come up with rebuttals. In groups of 2, discuss, formulate and deliver counter arguments to support legislation.

#### **Product** (Scenario-based Authentic Task) **Problem Statement:**

About one-third of the world's tobacco is produced and consumed in China. There are about 350 million smokers and 740 million secondhand smokers in China. Smoking rates in the young population and in females are increasing. The number of deaths attributed to tobacco use has reached 1.2 million per year, whereas the death toll is expected to rise to 2 million annually by 2025.

#### Task:

You are currently studying Chinese at Taiwan Normal University (TNU). Taiwan Medical Alliance for the Control of Tobacco, TMACT launches an essay contest to observe World No Tobacco Day. The contest calls for effective methods to quit smoking. Your instructor assigns everyone in class to write a short





### **Our Conference Keynote Speakers**



Christine Campbell (Ph.D., Purdue University) is President, Campbell Language Consultants, having worked in a variety of positions at the Defense Language Institute Foreign Language Center before retiring as Associate Provost.

In her last position there, she headed a directorate that practiced transformative teaching and learning. She has been a member of several editorial boards and has provided service to the profession as President of the American Association of the Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese and as Chair, Task Force Committee, whose purpose is to revise the World Readiness Standards in Spanish. She was also Director of Test Development, National Spanish Examinations and a member of the Board of Governors, UC Consortium for Language Learning and Teaching.

She received the Civilian of the Year Award for the Ninth Region from the Association of the United States Army in 1996 and was named Distinguished Alumna by Purdue University in 1994.



**Betty Lou Leaver** (Ph.D., Pushkin Institute, Moscow) is Director of The Literary Center of San Juan Bautista. She previously served as provost, associate provost, and dean at the Defense Language Institute Foreign Language Center (DLIFLC).

She established the language program for the International Space Station (NASA); served as a language training supervisor at the Foreign Service Institute, curriculum developer for the Federal Foreign Language Training Lab, dean at the New York Institute of Technology in Jordan, president of the American Global Studies Institute, co-director of the Center for the Advancement of Distinguished Language Proficiency at San Diego State University, and founding director of the Center for the Languages of the Central Asian Region at Indiana University.

She has published 21 books and more than 100 articles. Her transformative education efforts at DLIFLC received the 2015 Nikolai Khardajian Award for Innovation in International Education by the American Association of University Administrators.

Norman, "Norm" Litz was our indefatigable Treasurer, our money

man, keeping FLANC afloat and always concerned about our finances, always looked for funds for FLANC and for our world language teaching colleagues. He was there, at every Spring and Fall Conference, guiding the Executive Board, priving input into their programs, keeping our books, and constantly recruiting new members for our organization.

Cecilia Ross is part of the history of the Foreign Language Association of Northern California from its inception up to the present, we find one name continually and predominantly appearing on every page of that history. In 1951, Cecilia and two colleagues founded the Foreign Language Association of Northern California, to which she brilliantly and consistently contributed her talent, time and energy right up to the day of her fatal accident in June 1989. Cecilia made FLANC the effective and dynamic force it is today among teachers of foreign languages in Northern California. Her teaching, her research and her vigorous interest in every aspect of foreign language curricula at every level of instruction made Cecilia Ross an outstanding leader in foreign language education not only in the state of California, but nationwide as well.
